Barhop till you drop

The collection of alleyways known as Golden Gai in Shinjuku are a great way to experience about 270 bars without straying more than two blocks. Many of the bars have a cover between 500 and 1000 yen (\$5-\$10) and vary in theme from punk and glam to LGBTQfriendly. Foreigners won't be welcome in every spot, so read the room. → 1 Kabukicho, Shinjuku-ku

Cuddle up

At Harry Hedgehog Cafe in the nightlifecentric area of Roppongi, you can hold friendly hedgehogs (gingerly-their spikes do hurt if you rub them the wrong way) who snap live mealworms out of your hands in a very adorable way. to detail and hospitality, visit Koffee Mameya. Take home beans from around the world in cloth bags, which are lined up on the wall in a satisfying gradient of colors ranging from cream to dark brown. Sip slowly

Find the traditional teahouse **Kosoan** in a picturesque old home with triangular roofs, lush greenery and carefully maintained stone pathways. Patrons remove their shoes, sit on the floor and order from a menu (there's an English side) that boasts bean-based desserts and matchatea with ice cream.
